



**Adult Inpatients** shall have NO visitors except in the following circumstances. **This is by physician approval only.**

- A. *Patients who have been determined by the care team to be at the “end of life” may be visited by members of the immediate family.*
- B. *Patients with a disruptive behavior disorder, for whom a family member is essential to their care, may have one visitor.*
- C. *Adult patients who have altered mental status or physical or developmental delays (where a caregiver is necessary to assist) may have one visitor.*

**Pediatric Inpatients** are permitted to have only two adult visitors, but both must be parents, guardians or caregivers.

**Adult ER Patients** are not allowed visitors unless they are needed to assist in the care being provided in the ER setting. **This is by physician approval only.**

**Pediatric ER Patients** are permitted to have only one adult visitor.

**ICU Patients** are allowed only one designated support person **by physician approval only.**

**OB (Obstetric) Patients** may be accompanied by one visitor.

**Surgery Patients** (Adults) may have one visitor before and during the procedure for both inpatients and outpatients.

- For inpatients, the visitor **MUST** leave the hospital as soon as possible after the procedure has been completed and the patient is in the room.

## **Outpatient Procedures – Clinic Appointments**

Adult patients who have an appointment at a GLH–based clinic or procedure unit may not be accompanied by a visitor.

**Isolation Patients** shall have **NO** visitors under **ANY** circumstances.

## **Clergy Visits**

Every effort will be made to grant requests from a patient or family member for a visit from a chaplain, Eucharistic minister, community clergy or other spiritual leader.
